Why MTC?: I was interested in engineering/technology and had a great experience at Exploration Days. My brother attended Mitchell Tech and the campus just felt like home.

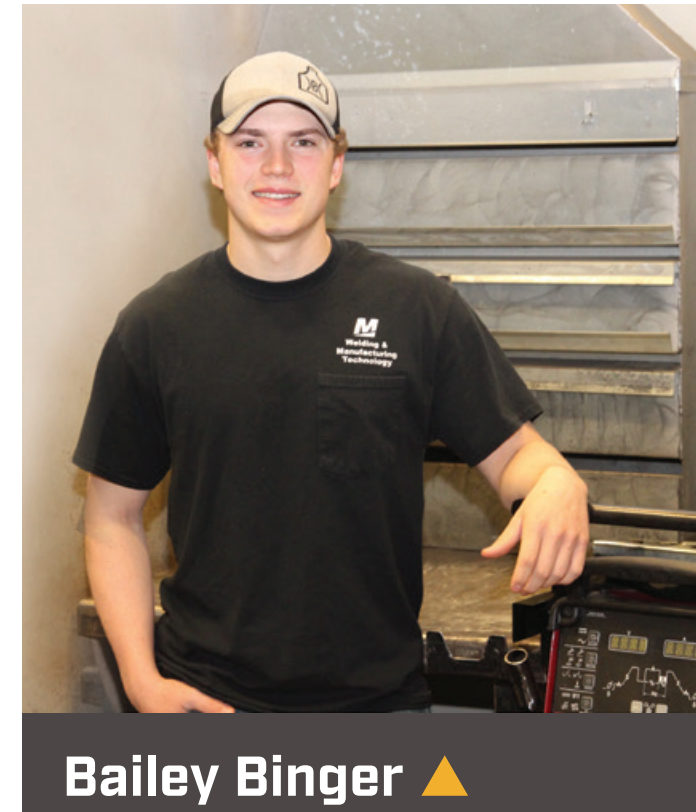

Mitchell Tech Alum Combines Passion with a Purpose

Mike Sprang vividly remembers putting together his first board with a switch and a light bulb at Willow Lake High School. When he flipped the switch, nothing happened. He chuckles over the memory, but also recalls this as a defining moment in his life.

“I remember being really excited about this project, probably more excited than anything else I had been exposed to in high school,” he says. “My actual light bulb didn’t turn on, but a different kind of light bulb went off in my head. I knew this might be the path for me.”

Fortunately for Mike, several key things fell into place to make this path a reality.

“My brother Bob and his family had recently moved to Mitchell and they told me I could live with them if I wanted to attend Mitchell Tech,” explains Mike. “Mitchell Tech had a two-year Electrical Construction and Maintenance degree. Thanks to this degree, I was able to land a job before I graduated.”

Another important piece of the puzzle came together in the Mitchell Tech financial aid office.

“I grew up in a household with a lot of love but not a lot of money,” he explains. “My father passed away when I was two and my mom did the best she could. I didn’t know what was possible, but the Director of Financial Aid, Grant Uecker, was so kind and compassionate. He did everything to help me get the funding I needed, from helping with all the paperwork for taking out a student loan to finding good work study opportunities. He was critical to my success.”

Over forty years later, Mike is still excited to go to work every day. He spent twenty-eight years at J.H. Larson where he served as branch manager beginning in 1995. Through the years, he has been passionate about continuing his education and staying on top of the industry.

In 2011, he was designated as a Certified Lighting Efficiency Professional by the Association of Energy Engineers. In May of this year, Mike took a new position as the Director of Sales at TSTM in Sioux Falls.

“I decided to do something different for the last part of my career,” he explains. “Even though I’ve been in this industry for decades, it’s still fun to learn new things.”

Throughout his career, Mike has been deeply involved in serving both the industry and Mitchell Tech. One of his favorite positions is serving on the MTC Foundation Board of Trustees.

“The Foundation is really on the right track and moving in the right direction,” he says. “The people on board are great advocates and we are in the middle of some exciting things. The Center for Student Success is something that is here to serve the needs of all students, but especially the needs of students who might be struggling or needing some extra assistance. Whether helping with life skills or gas money or just basic needs, the Center for Student Success is a difference maker.”

Giving back is so important to Mike that he uses a quote from Theodore Roosevelt as his personal mantra: “Every man owes a part of his time and money to the business or industry in which he is engaged.”

He also has some experienced advice for the students he encounters at MTC.

“It doesn’t matter what it is you do, but it does matter that you build a base of knowledge. Make sure you enjoy what you are doing, and then get the basics down in college. The real learning happens on the job. Make sure you keep up with what is happening in your industry, keep learning, and stay involved. If you do a great job and stay true to who you are, you will be successful.”

The Center for Student Success

Provides Support Beyond the Classroom

On a small campus like Mitchell Tech, it's easy to notice when something just isn't right. Perhaps a student suddenly stops coming to class. Maybe the student's grades have significantly dropped, or a negative attitude or behavior is now surfacing in the classroom.

Thanks to the Center for Student Success, there is an avenue to support these situations. By utilizing the Student Alert system, instructors and staff can privately submit concerns about the academic, personal, social, physical, or mental well-being of a student to the Center for Student Success. After a Student Alert is submitted, the Director of Student Success will determine the best course of action to address the concern and provide appropriate support to the student.

"We have four student success coaches on staff, including two who have degrees in mental health counseling," explains Danita Lucas, Director of MTC's Center for Student Success. "Our department has grown from just one coach to four, and our services have expanded to include things like the Student Alert program, a food pantry we call the Mitchell Tech Cupboard, and our student emergency fund called the MTCares Fund. Our goal is to help students thrive in all aspects of their life, not just in the classroom."

MTC's Center for Student Success started to take shape in 2016 as it transitioned from the Instructional Services Center. Rather than just offering faculty support, tutoring and academic resources, the evolving Center began incorporating

student success coaches, disability services, career placement services and a mandatory first-year seminar course called Student Success, designed to help students navigate the MTC experience successfully.

"Each coach teaches the Student Success course, focused on things like financial aid, time management, study skills and specifically how to use the Center for Student Success," says Danita. "We really try to promote our services during this class, so students understand the depth of resources available to them for free, right here on campus."

One of the more recent projects being launched by the Center includes a Foundation initiative to enhance the MTCares Fund. This fund ensures money is available to students facing financial burdens that may cause them to drop out.

"Some of our students work forty hours a week just to be here," explains Danita. "They are living paycheck to paycheck with no family support. So when their car breaks down or they can't pay rent or they need gas money, the situation can be very stressful. They can apply to utilize the MTCares Fund to help them through the rough patch and stay in school. Our goal is for the student to graduate and move into a rewarding career."



The Center for Student Success Mission Statement

It is the purpose of The Center for Student Success to provide students with the services and support necessary to fulfill their educational, personal, and career goals.

A full list of services provided by The Center for Student Success includes:

- Help with academic coursework, including tutoring, study aids, research databases, print resources, and electronic media
- Assistance with course scheduling, program changes, graduation requirements, and withdrawing from a program or class
- Coaching for students to help them work through academic, personal, and career-related challenges
- Counseling services related to mental health and personal concerns
- Advising and academic success plans
- Disability and Learning Services
- Guidance on career decisions, internship selection, job searches, resumes, and interviews
- Information about Mitchell Tech's Student Representative Board and other Mitchell Tech clubs and activities
- Printing, copying, and scanning services
- Computer access, including Internet, email, MyTech and application software
- Guidance on where to access important campus services, such as financial aid, Business Office, scholarships, etc.
- Information about off-campus resources, such as housing, healthcare, transportation, financial sources, student discounts, available memberships, childcare, and other support services



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Dale Letcher Memorial Scholarship

Keeping a Legacy Alive

“He was so proud of those homes. He could tell you the details of each and every one of them,” explains his wife, Sheila.

When Dale Letcher was alive, he and his wife Sheila had a habit of driving past the homes Mitchell Tech students built as part of the Architectural Design and Building Construction program he instructed.

“He was so proud of those homes. He could tell you the details of each and every one of them,” explains his wife, Sheila. “He and his students helped build about sixty houses before he retired.”

Dale’s devotion to Mitchell Tech continued after he passed away in 2020.

“Dale had Alzheimer’s and COPD. We knew he wasn’t going to get better,” says Sheila. “We sat down before he got too sick and talked about this. The scholarship was his idea. He loved MTI and wanted to help students who needed the money.”

“That was truly special. The first scholarship recipient’s name is Brandon

Bosworth, and he is just the salt of the earth,” she says. “Dale would have liked him. Mitchell Tech is so good at keeping us connected. Meeting Brandon was beyond thoughtful.”

Today, students can apply for the Dale Letcher Memorial Scholarship at MTC if they are entering



into the Architectural Design and Building Construction program. The award is worth \$1,000, with \$500 distributed each year of the two-year program. Dale’s wife, Sheila, and his children, Laura, Michael, and Bradley, are proud to remain part of the college their dad considered his second home for nearly three decades.

“We used to joke that if our house was on fire and Mitchell Tech was on fire, Dale would go to the school and put that fire out first,” says Sheila. “That’s how much he loved his job.”

Alum Spotlight:

Katie Royston, Radiation Therapy

Katie Royston graduated with an Associate of Arts degree in radiologic technology and then continued her education at Mitchell Tech with an Associate of Arts degree in radiation therapy. She completed her coursework in 2010 and took a position at Avera Queen of Peace Hospital, where she currently works full-time in the cancer center as a radiation therapist.

Q: Why did you pursue a career in radiology?

Katie: I was diagnosed with a malignant tumor at age six, and part of my cancer treatment included radiation therapy. I always thought I would like to help other people the way those radiation therapists helped me. The program was newly available at Mitchell Tech after graduating high school, so it was great timing.

Q: What drew you to Mitchell Tech?

Katie: I did apply to other places that offered this program, but Mitchell Tech offered the associate’s degree and not just a certificate. The school was affordable and it was close to home, plus I was able to live off-campus close to my family, so it was the best of both worlds.

Q: Are there any people on campus who made a strong impact?

Katie: I have great things to say about all my professors. I do want to mention one—her name was Leeann Messer at the time. She has since passed away, but she was a very compassionate teacher who really cared about her students. She was a big part of my experience.

Q: How do you stay connected to MTC?

Katie: When I worked in the X-ray department at Queen of Peace hospital, I was a clinical instructor for Mitchell Tech students during their clinicals. Now that I work in radiation therapy, we get one student each semester who works in our department as part of their clinical experience. Also, my husband Jesse teaches Wi-Fi and Broadband Technologies at MTC, and it is fun to see all the amazing things they have for faculty and their families, like the Christmas parties and on-campus events.

Q: What would you tell someone who is considering MTC?

Katie: When I attended, MTC was MTI and it was located by the high school. Since then, the campus is all-new with amazing facilities out by the interstate and a growing list of programs and opportunities. MTC is making an impact in our community and our state, and the education you will receive is not only affordable, but relevant to today’s job market. I can’t say enough good things.



Hats Off to the MTC Rodeo Team!

It all started in 1992 with three bull riders and an innocent request.

“When students come to you asking if they can start something new on campus, you say yes, and then you’re it,” jokes Jimmie Nicolaus, who has been on staff at MTC since 1996, both as an instructor in the electrical program and currently as an Maintenance Tech. “Those three students were the beginning of Mitchell Tech’s Rodeo Team, and I have been along for the ride ever since.”



Jimmie says the area rodeo community is very supportive of the MTC students, giving them places to board their horses, providing opportunities for fundraising,

and even offering venues for the occasional practice. Students raise money for the club through projects like parking cars at Dakotafest, helping at the Avera Gala, and hosting the Mavericks Rodeo Rendezvous each fall.

Because Jimmie is well connected in the rodeo community, his involvement with the rodeo team helps attract students to the program and to MTC. He is assisted by Blaine Carey, who heads up the timed events. Blaine is an instructor in MTC’s SD Center for Farm/Ranch Management Program and provides valuable expertise as a former college rodeo head coach.

The rodeo club is the only organization on campus that travels to athletic competitions, but Jimmie says MTC instructors are understanding of the time students are away from class.

“These students miss several days of school each year for rodeos, and they are pretty good at time management, just like most student-athletes,” he explains. “They learn to be responsible and go on to be very successful. I am pretty proud of the places they end up. Must be why I keep on doing this—and a special thanks to my wife Janet and our sons for putting up with this crazy life all these years!”

“People are always surprised that we have a rodeo team. Then they are really surprised when I tell them it’s been around for thirty years!” says Jimmie.

The rodeo team’s membership has fluctuated over the years, with anywhere between three and twenty-seven members on the roster. The 2021-22 season included eighteen students. The athletes are welcome to compete in any standard college rodeo event. The team generally competes in six rodeos each fall and four or five rodeos in the spring, weather depending. The group travels all over the Midwest, generally caravanning with trucks, trailers, and the MTC van, which is driven by Jimmie.

“I tell the students riding with me, if you don’t like seventies rock, you might want to find a different ride,” he jokes. “We usually travel about six hours each way so I get to know them all pretty well. Rodeo is a small world, so these students are able to make friends and connections that last a lifetime. Many of them keep rodeoing after college.”
